SUBJECT: 2023-2024 IACSC Charge

#### **Background**

Pursuant to the recommendations of the Illinois Abroad Implementation Committee (IAIC), three goals that underly the establishment of the inaugural 2022-2024 IACSC are:

- Maintain work already implemented by the colleges, schools and IAGE, with IAIC coordination.
- Complete implementation of outstanding recommendations by the IAIC.
- Serve as forum to oversee study abroad operations across our campus.

### **IACSC Purpose**

The purpose of the IACSC is tied to the academic mission of Illinois, where the university aspires to provide its students with transformative learning experiences. As articulated in the university's strategic plan, *The Next 150 (2018-2023)*, and in the emerging *Boldly Illinois*, study abroad is among the integrative learning experiences that undergraduates should be encouraged to complete before graduation. Such experiences are designed to help students develop global awareness and cultural competencies that are expected of land-grant research university graduates in the twenty-first century. The delivery of integrative learning experiences requires strategic collaboration between college-wide and university-wide units. Therefore, the IACSC is established as a forum in which these strategic and collaborative partnerships associated with study abroad can be defined, managed, evolved, and evaluated.

### **Revised IACSC Responsibilities and Tasks**

The expectation is that over the 2023-24 academic year, IAC working groups will continue the work that started last year and issue specific recommendations to address any problems or challenges they may encounter in their research and analysis of study abroad at the university. The steering committee will then review and prioritize recommendations for presentation to leadership as well as discuss strategies for communicating progress toward goals with the broader campus community.

The committee is hereby charged with the following responsibilities and tasks:

- 1. IAC working groups shall complete the work in progress outlined in the 2023 IACSC Annual Report.
- 2. IAC working groups shall research, analyze, and explore possible solutions to the identified unresolved study abroad issues or challenges, as listed on the 2023 IACSC Annual Report.
- 3. Using the Recommendation Report Template (Appendix A), IAC working groups shall draft specific study abroad recommendations to address the unresolved issues or challenges.

### Study Abroad Recommendation Submission, Review, and Approval Processes

- Working groups shall share drafts of study abroad recommendations with the IAC Steering Committee for review and feedback.
- 2. Based on feedback received, working groups shall revise (if necessary) and formally submit study abroad recommendations by uploading them to the Box folder *Recommendation Reports*.
- 3. IACSC co-chairs will submit for initial review the study abroad recommendations to the Associate Chancellor and Vice Provost for International Affairs & Global Strategies and the Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education.
- 4. Policy recommendations will be reviewed and approved by the appropriate university officials (e.g., Provost, Council of Undergraduate Deans, CAM committee). If further clarifications are needed, the IACSC will address any issues or concerns in writing.
- 5. Recommendations related to standards (i.e., mandatory courses of action or rules) shall be reviewed and approved by the Associate Chancellor and Vice Provost for International Affairs & Global Strategies and the Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education.
- 6. Recommendations related to procedures (i.e., step-by-step instructions) or guidelines (e.g., best practices) shall be reviewed and approved by the IAC Steering Committee.
- 7. The IAC Steering Committee will discuss and identify the best strategies for disseminating the approved recommendations to the campus community.

# **Concluding Note**

Given that the IAC is a new governance structure for education abroad at Illinois, the Associate Chancellor and Vice Provost for International Affairs & Global Strategies will periodically evaluate the effectiveness of the Council and its Steering Committee, consulting with members, Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education, and the Council of Undergraduate Deans. These consultations may lead the Associate Chancellor and Vice Provost for International Affairs & Global Strategies to revise the purpose of the Illinois Abroad Council and Steering Committee, and/or to revise its structure. The primary consideration in the evaluation is whether the IAC makes meaningful contributions to efforts to increase the number and diversity of students who access and experience study abroad at Illinois, while maintaining operational excellence.
